Nane Annan: Speaker of the Jan Tucker Memorial Lecture

As you are aware, the Jan Tucker Memorial Lecture has become one of the traditions and highlights of the International Assembly (IA) annual conference program. At the 2001 annual NCSS conference, the IA was pleased to have Mrs. Nane Annan, spouse of Secretary-General of the United Nations, Kofi Annan, as the 2001 Jan Tucker Memorial Lecturer.

Mrs. Annan spoke passionately about many of the critical concerns and challenges that confront our global community, especially issues of poverty, diseases, refugee, education, widening disparity between the haves and have-nots and between and among nations. Specifically, she focused on her global experience, her visits with people, old and young, from one corner of the globe to another, as she traveled with her husband. She spoke about the pains of people she met, especially those of children who have been denied their human rights—education, basic needs—food, family, shelter, security, and freedom. her book, *The United Nations: Come along with Me!* One of the passages she read was a song that the children she met in Angola sung to her, which reflected their pains, deprivation, and sufferings:

*We are children and we need a mother who hugs us.
What can you do about that?
We are children and we need a father who takes care of us.
What can you do about that?
We are children and we need to go to school.
What can you do about that?
We are children and we need a childhood.
What can you do about that? (Annan 2000, page 18)*

Mrs. Annan's speech was quite timely and brought meaning to the conference theme—forming a more perfect union. Can we form a perfect global union when more than half of the human family lives on less than \$2 a day? Can we form a more perfect global union when millions of children—the natural resource of the world—are denied opportunities to unleash their potentials?

Mrs. Annan's speech was also very inspiring, but more importantly, was a sharp reminder of the challenge that we face as social studies educators. As social studies educators, how can we be more responsible and responsive in our charge to educate for critical national and global citizenship? How can we collectively and collaboratively create effective citizens who are empowered to transform our world to make it more humane, equitable, just, and peaceful? The critical challenges that face our global community demand collaboration. The work we have begun in the IA is a step in this direction but we must do more. We must move our conversations toward addressing some of the challenges Mrs. Annan brought to our attention. Together I hope we can move toward a more critical dialogue about these issues and pursue the best ways to prepare the young to build a better, just, and humane world.
