## What are the Advanced Respiratory **<u>COURSES</u>** offered at Towson University?

# How are the Advanced Respiratory Therapy courses different than what I took at the Community College?

The Advanced Respiratory Therapy courses at Towson are delivered using the foundation content taught in most entry-level Respiratory programs and <u>builds</u> on them using <u>research, critical thinking</u> and <u>assessment</u> <u>skills</u>, and <u>related work experience</u>. Several of the courses include topics that are only briefly discussed during your community college training.

#### How are the Allied Health Program courses delivered?

All of the Advanced Respiratory Therapy classes are delivered in a <u>fully online</u> asynchronous format. You will have assignments due on specific dates, but the classes don't "meet" at set times. All of the Allied Health Program Core courses and also those in the <u>Administration/Management Track</u> are <u>fully online</u>.

#### When are these courses offered?

One Advanced Respiratory Class is offered every <u>Fall and Spring</u> semester. Courses are sometimes offered in alternating years.

# If I choose another track and I am a Respiratory Therapist, can I take Advanced Respiratory Therapy classes as electives?

<u>Yes</u>, you have the clinical background to enroll in these classes. Since students must have a minimum of 32 upper division credits and a minimum of 120 credits for graduation, you can take these Respiratory classes to fulfill other University requirements.

### Can I take Advanced Respiratory Therapy classes even if I'm not going to enroll for a degree?

<u>Yes</u>, you can enroll as a non-degree student and take these classes. If you decide in the future to apply to Towson for the Allied Health Program, the courses you took as a non-degree student would count toward your degree. More information can be found at:
